- He holds multiple records, most notably for being the youngest male in history to win the FIS Cross-Country World Cup




 The winter Games were held for the first time in a Scandinavian country.









The mascots in the winter Olympics 1994 were called Håkon, Kristin and Andre was the official mascot of the 1994 winter Paralympics

- Norway was a part of the Kingdom of Denmark–Norway, and from 1814 to 1905
- Eastern Norway, sheltered by the mountains, has an inland climate with warm summers, cold winters, and less than 30inches (760 mm) of mean annual precipitation
- Norway experiences flooding, ice jams, strong winds, snowstorms, avalanches, storm surges at sea, permafrost, the occasional earthquake and tsunami
